Treasurer's Report – John McLaughlin

We started with a balance of \$21,100 and ended with a balance of \$11,600. However, we are awaiting a grant check for \$6000; all of the Woody repairs have been paid.

All the Repairs are done and the Woody is in the water ready to sail. Many thanks to Gigi and others who managed the repairs, which we completed on time and within the budget. Now that's something you don't see often.

Strawberry Festival-

The scheduling of vendors, speakers, and musicians is essential done. Thanks for a job well done. A new strawberry trailer refrigerator has been build thanks to Ron Bell, Henry Thurston, and Saul Rozinsky. We need lots of volunteers to set up tents, and mark off vendor sites hook up electric and water, early Saturday morning. We need people with pick-up trucks to carry tents and chairs for setting up.

At 10 am we adjourn to Tom Labarr's to prep strawberries and to enjoy a special blended concoction of Strawberries and some other mysterious liquid which makes it quite tasty.

We need everyone to volunteer. This is our big event and we need all hands on board. If you haven't signed up for a job come anyway and we will put you where you are needed. We also need coolers to key some items cold and others warm. So if you have a large cooler bring it with you.

The Quadricentennial – Mary Schmalz, David Cohen

Scenic Hudson is hosting a festival to meet the flotilla on Sunday. We need volunteers to distribute literature and promote the club. The Woody will be in Poughkeepsie Tuesday to be greeted by cannons and 400 candles. Please come and support the crew.

Announcements

Marcellus Shale Mining- John McLaughlin spoke out against the mining of the Marcellus Shale for Oil and gas. Each mine uses millions of gallons of water which they mix with a toxic brew of chemicals. This concoction is then injected into the ground where it can contaminate aquifers. Some is reclaimed and held in on site retention ponds which have been known to leak and contaminate surrounding areas. This mining is potentially the biggest current threat to our drinking water.

Riverpark Tree Fund- Betty Harkins asked for support for replacement of trees in Riverfront Park. The hat was passed and we raised \$102.

River Pool-The River Pool will go in the water June the 19th and 20th and will officially open July 4th. The Newburgh-Beacon Swim is July 25th. They have requested volunteers to help.

Fishkill Creek Festival July 25th - This festival will be at Riverfront Park following the Rive Pool Swim. Beacon Sloop club is co-sponsoring this festival in conjunction with Fishkill Watershed Committee, Cornell Cooperative Education Center of Dutchess County. We will also need volunteers. David Eberle is festival director; Chris Ruhe is in charge of music. John Hall and Pete Seeger will be guests. There will be music, speakers, food, children's activities and an art show on the theme of creeks, streams and rivers.

Fishkill Supply Depot -Nate Binzen spoke about the depot which is New York's Valley Forge. Much of this encampment site has already been developed. A recent survey with ground penetrating radar shows a large number of graves and skeletons. This is likely to be the largest burial site of Revolutionary War Soldiers in America. Senator Chuck Schumer has promised Federal help to preserve this last remaining parcel. We will be forever indebted to the perseverance of Marty Byster, Nate Binzen and his brother, an archeologist from Boston and Mara Ferrell who carried the idea of preservation forward in the face of intense opposition and disinterest. Executive Committee Meeting Minutes Wednesday, May 26, 2009

Meeting called to order by Claudine Craig Vice-President in the absence of Saul Rozinsky due to illness.

Financial report:

John McLaughlin submitted the financial Report
Our balance has decreased from \$21,100 to \$11,600
But there is an outstanding grant of \$6000 and all the Woody Repair bills have been paid. Another grant proposal is being submitted to Coyote Foundation

Strawberry Festival:

A new refrigerated strawberry trailer has been constructed and a new solar trailer has been constructed.

David Eberle Volunteered to tow the trailer.

Festival signs need to be made.

Hudson Valley Fresh is donating 64 Qts of cream and will be giving away milk.

1200 lbs of local strawberries for Shortcake and 200 lbs of California berries for smoothies have been ordered.

We need coolers to hold Smoothies and milk. Biscuit dry mix is on order. A commercial convection oven has been rented and will be delivered the day before. It holds 5 18in x 26in trays and should really speed up biscuit baking
We need 3-4 hot boxes or coolers to keep biscuits warm.

Ron Bell is handling electrical and water. Trash disposal is being coordinated by Sue Altkin. A trash truck will be located in the center of the park and not near the strawberry tent. This will make people more aware of the disposal process.

We have 53 vendors and crafts people. We have fewer food vendors which should resolve the complaints that there were too many competing vendors last year. We need the line marker for marking off sites.

Speakers: Jonathon Wright of Clearwater, Vane Lashua of Mid-Hudson progressive Alliance. Rich from Stonykill. and others. Talks will be between musical sets. Beacon District Schools will be having an Art fair.

Quadricentennial:

June 7-9 and June 14-16 Hudson-Fulton Quadracentennial Festival. Scenic Hudson will be having a festival at River Point Park from 2pm until 8pm Sunday June 7th Boat flotilla arrives at 6pm Sunday. The Beacon Sloop Club and the Woody Guthrie will be participating. David Eberle is the Land Captain and David Cohen is the Harbor Captain. Mary Schmalz continues to keep us updated on quad activities.

Ships to be in port here are Mystic Whaler, Clearwater, Woody Guthrie and Half Moon, Onrust, Coast Guard, and PT boat.

Development and Fundraising:

A benefit dance for Woody Guthrie is being organized by a local dance group.

The end of maintenance as we know it..

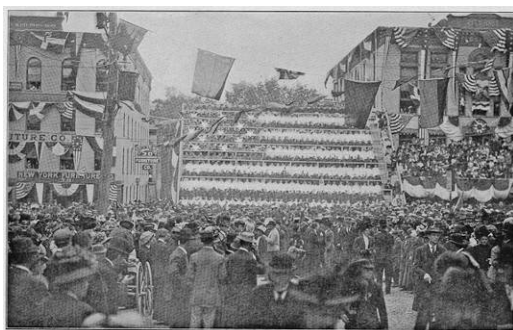

Chris Bowser, science education specialist with the NYS department of Environmental Conservation, Hudson River Estuary Program and National Estuarine Research Reserve



gave an extremely interesting and entertaining talk on, *Eels, Aliens, and Shipwrecks*. Including a live Chinese Mitten Crab (the alien) and a jar full of glass eels which had the kids excited.

Chris also described his eel survey results and showed a short film of his team of high school students in action. He recapped other scientific studies involving the river such as the mapping of the bottom. Although he was not able to disclose their locations he showed images of several shipwrecks including full sloops and steamboats. You never know what we may be sailing over.

We had a packed house with many first time visitors to the club. Chris is a great speaker and great ambassador for the Hudson River. It was a great way to end a very successful series of talks.

400 years ago – Rough weather

From Robert Juet's journal:

June 15 We had a great storm which broke our foremast. We lost it overboard along with the foresail which was set low.

June 16 By reason of the unconstant weather we were forced to lie-a-trie with our mainsail. So we sailed this way for four watches southeast by south for 25 1/2 miles, and two watches for 18 miles

June 19 In the morning the weather was fair and calm, and we set a temporary mast with a foresail in place of the one that had been carried away.

Lie-a-trie is a procedure to make the ship sail close to the wind by reducing sail, bringing the tack close aboard, the sheets close aft, and the helm tied close aboard.

Quadricentennial Flotilla Begins

The Woody joined the Clearwater, Mystic Whaler, Half Moon, Onrust, and other heritage vessels to lead the Hudson-Fulton Quadricentennial flotilla. If you didn't see the arrival of the boats Sunday you missed a great event.

We had a fantastic sail down to Nyack - we left Cornwall about 2:45 pm on Saturday - were well greeted and tied up right next to The Onrust at the Nyack Boat Club about 7:00 pm and slept on the boat. Mystic, Clearwater, and Half Moon were across the river at Tarrytown.

Up early, we headed up the river with the flotilla. We struggled a bit to keep up with the 7-knot pace, but held our own. Into West Haverstraw where we received a plaque and picked up Ken and pressed Alan and Robert off Clearwater. We headed out ahead of the flotilla in order to be able to pass West Point along with them. Along the way, thanks to Ken who brought his trusty blunderbuss, we exchanged cannon salutes with Ft. Montgomery and Garrison.

We got to Garrison ahead of the fleet and treated the crowd to a display of our sailing talent and beautiful ship. We dropped into line when the flotilla arrived and passed West Point where a 16 gun salute was answered by a broadside from the Half-Moon. On up the gut and into Newburgh Bay and our faithful docks at Beacon where we received a great response from the crowd at Long Dock and the Scenic Hudson Festival.

We were accompanied by an old fire boat that put on such spectacular displays with her water cannons at important places such as Garrison and Newburgh. What a sight. We were rarely very near to Half Moon, so did not get to see Ben or Steve, nor did we see Edmund on Mystic. We had sloop club members on four different vessels. We were in line behind The Onrust under command of Capt. Joya a former Captain on Clearwater; she is magnificent and loved by her crew. Remember, this boat has been on the water only about 13 days. We got back into Beacon around 7:00 pm - well baked, tired, and very happy to have participated in a historic event.

We should also give thanks to those Beacon Sloop Club members who helped to make the land event a success. David Cohen Harbor Captain, Tony Monahan our outgoing Harbor Master. David Eberle Land Captain, Mary Schmalz Publicity and Communications, and Kevin Haydon who seemed to be everywhere and who manned the Beacon Sloop Club Table for 7 hours. And of course, Pete Seeger and Chris Ruhe who provided music.

A note from Jim Birmingham, captain:

I want to thank each of you for making the first leg of the Quad sail a tremendous success. Each of you contributed in your own way and we all came together as one for what was truly a once in a life time event. I know I will never forget it. Special thanks to Steve Feyl who saved us all and somehow came out unscathed.

Here's wishing the next leg will be just as fun and memorable.
