Beacon Sloop Club General Meeting Minutes, September 3, 2010

Michael Scolnick led the assembled company sitting outside in yet another beautiful summer evening sunset in song and introduced Claudine Craig who called the meeting to order. She welcomed new visitors from Campbell Hall, Brooklyn and Middletown.

Treasurer's Report, Sarah Elisabeth. Sarah reported that the Corn Festival netted \$2,855.30. The current Treasurer's report is elsewhere in the Broadside. Sarah has set up the new laptop with QuickBooks and antivirus and a new era in BSC accounting has begun. Claudine gave Bonnie Champion great kudos for having done a wonderful job of organizing the Corn Festival.

Woody Guthrie, Jim Birmingham. The Woody was very busy this month what with the BSC Corn Fest and the Garrison Art Festival in late August along with the evening sails. A leak was discovered within the last couple of weeks. A sprung plank on the starboard forward hull was the cause. It was repaired at White's Marina.

Building Committee, Claudine Craig. Gigi Fris and Alice Vaughan have proceeded with the cleaning and painting of the interior of the Club house. Work on the patio will proceed after more planning.

Grants/Development, Claudine Craig. The Hudson River Fund has come forward with a \$10,000 grant for repairs on the cockpit of the Woody and another has been offered by the Coyote Foundation though the amount is not available.

Announcements.

Judy & John Allen celebrated the 25th anniversary of their meeting at the Sloop Club under the tree beside the front door. The membership sang "happy anniversary" and also wished Judy well on the Sept. 10th opening of her play at the Depot Theatre in Garrison.

Tom LaBarr presented a recap of the Beacon Deserves Better view of the City of Beacon's outlook on the TOD project and the regular meeting schedule for BDB. (<http://beacondeservesbetter.com>).

David Sager, 42nd State Senate District Candidate presented his credentials to the Club and asked for member support. He has been especially active (and successful) in helping to bring the moratorium on gas hydro-fracturing in New York.

David Rocco, former project manager for the Walkway, is now working on the Beacon Fire tower. He has organized local ironworkers to install steel reinforcing, saving the group about \$15,000. There is a press event scheduled for Tuesday, Sept. 14 at 10:30am. He has invited local non-profits to join the Fire tower at the base of Mt. Beacon for the announcement. Dave also noted that Saturday, Oct. 2 is the 1-year anniversary of Walkway over the Hudson and hopes that all will turn out for the celebration.

Joyce Hanson announced two free programs and a contra dance event for tug and barge week in Cold Spring (9/4-5).

Mark McCarroll passed the hat to support the patio.

Bonnie Champion thanked all the volunteers for the Corn Festival.

Beverly Dykeman, a three-sloop club member, announced events at two sister clubs, <http://riverlovers.org> and <http://www.ferrysloops.org/>.

Harbor Update

The solar light to mark the harbor has been identified but not yet purchased. Vents for the shed were purchased. Thefts from the docks continue to be a problem. The latest item was a set of oars. We are encouraging people to report incidents to the Beacon Police.



Through a great team effort the pontoon boat was recovered from the harbor following its sinking. There were two holes in the front and one in the back of one pontoon. The harbor team

is looking into repair options. We have about one month to find a solution before fall clean up of the harbor.

Mona and Jim Birmingham: Mona and Jim met in High School and have been together ever since. They were married at 21 and spent time in long Island, Block Island and Killington where Jim performed folk, rock and jazz as a solo artist and with a duo for several seasons.



Mona received 2 degrees from the Fashion Institute of Technology and worked in NYC for many years in the fashion industry. After realizing the music industry was not exactly what he thought, Jim got into computers to earn a living but continues to play and write. They have 3 children ranging in age from 17 to 26.



Mona, who after receiving her Bachelor's degree from the New York School of Interior Design was working as an Interior Designer in NYC and noticed a sign at the Beacon train station looking for crew to sail on the Woody Guthrie. Jim, who was working in northern New Jersey and missed regular sailing since moving to the Hudson Valley, jumped at the chance. His first sighting of the Woody Guthrie was as Captain Rich

Gallagher brought the boat over to the long dock on the south side of the Harbor. His first reaction was, look at this pirate ship. Jim started sailing with Captain Rich on Wednesday's in June of 2004 while Captain Tom Baldino was on an extended vacation. When the crew said Captain Tom was coming back he said, "who is Captain Tom."

Jim is now a Woody Captain and Chairman of the Woody Sailors Committee. He started sailing on the Connetquot River on the south shore of Long Island at the age of 11 and he and Mona sailed for many years together on their 18' Hobie Catamaran that is still in the family with his brother Kevin who originally got him into sailing. They have their own 26' Grampian sloop named North River Wind which is kept on a mooring at Beacon. They both enjoy sailing and hope to do some extended excursions back to Block Island in the future.
