Message from Our President:

This is a busy week for the Beacon Sloop Club. It began on Sunday, the 3rd with participation in Riverpool's Newburgh to Beacon swim. The Woody was there to ferry some swimmers to the starting point, and she remained "on station" for the duration of the event. A good number of our members participated either by swimming, as kayaker-escorts, or as shore support for the event.

We are also participating in the National Night Out festivities in Beacon on Tuesday August 5th.

The week will end with our club sail on Clearwater on Saturday evening, and we'll take the liberty of stretching the week by one day, to include our great Corn Festival on Sunday, the 10th.

Our order is already in for 1000 ears of the finest local sweet corn from a farm in Campbell Hall, right across the river in Orange County. The vendor, Madura Farms, is a regular participant in the Beacon Farmers Market.

The Woody was sailed up to White's Marina on Monday, the 4th. Some leakage had been noticed and it was deemed serious enough by the captains and by a professional shipwright to merit further investigation. At this time, the plan is to remove the batteries from below deck and place them in the cockpit. In this way, detailed inspection of the hull will be possible, while the weight and displacement of the boat remain unchanged. It is likely that the temporary repairs will be made, and that the Woody will return to Beacon harbor to complete the sailing season.

After finishing a fast-food salad a few days ago, I noticed that there was no recycling code on the bottom of the plastic plate. I also noticed that there were no separate containers for plastic waste.

In the same community that the fast food restaurant was in, residences are required to separate their trash and put it out as "garbage," "co-mingled recyclables" or "paper and cardboard." Are restaurants exempt from these rules? If so, it seems a bit absurd, as some restaurants probably generate a lot more waste per meal than residential users do. The least they could do is mark their containers with a recycling code, and provide a separate trash bin for those customers who want to keep the plastic out of the landfill.

Beacon Sloop Club General Meeting Minutes August 1, 2008

After a wonderful pot luck supper (thanks to those who bring food) and some music by Pete Seeger and friends, the meeting was called to order by president Saul Rozinsky.

Committee reports:

Treasurer's report:

Monthly expenses were \$3,259 primarily because of the purchase of a new rowboat at a cost of \$2,715. Final balance was \$34,827. The Grange donated \$400 in appreciation for a Woody sail organized for them.

Woody Report:

A new rowboat was purchased to replace the one which was stolen. The Woody has developed a significant leak most likely due to a sprung board and/or caulking failure. This leak is requiring continuous pumping to keep the boat afloat. The Woody will be taken out of the water to assess the cause of the problem and decide on an appropriate course of action. Ah, the joys of owning a wooden sail boat. A wooden boat is always in a perpetual state of transition from what it was to what it will be. I wonder if there is some part of the boat that was or is still original.

Corn Festival:

The Corn Festival is scheduled for Sunday August 10th from 12PM to 5 PM. We need volunteers. We need volunteers. David Cohen and Lynn Eberle volunteered to make chili, both meat and vegetarian chili to sell at the festival.

Executive Committee Meeting Minutes

Tuesday, July 22

The meeting was held at the Beacon Sloop Club at 7:30pm with Saul Rozinsky presiding.

Corn Fest:

Various technical details were discussed – flyers, corn, porta-potties, dumpster, chili – and resolved with no motions required.

Storage Space:

Saul Rozinsky led a discussion regarding the pros and cons of paying for storage space at the now Beacon City owned Settlement Camp or rehabbing the old chicken shed at Tom LaBarr's house that is now being used. No motions filed.

Re-chartering with Clearwater:

Woody Report:

The new Boat Bag program to provide environmental education to Woody guests has been a great success. The new row boat to replace the old stolen Woody tender is on order. Tom LaBarr reports that the Woody captains have been investigating the source of heavy water leaks. Various sources have been confirmed, including a sprung plank and leaks around butt blocks. Leakage, while heavy, appears to be consistent. If it gets worse however, the *Woody* season may need to be curtailed. Captains will monitor the leaks and provide updates.

Treasurers Report:

Jim Finnigan presented an update on BSC accounts, which was accepted by the board.

Grants and Development:

Kevin Haydon reported that a grant application made to the Koinonia Foundation (www.kfoundation.com) for \$1500 for the Woody Guthrie Phase 4 Restoration Fund was successful. The trustees of the Foundation stated that the grant application appealed on many levels for its community-building and environmental stewardship.

Code of Conduct:

Discussion was had over the suggestion that a code of conduct be considered as a guide to respectful and productive communications among members and outside agencies. Kevin Haydon agreed to bring samples that could be viewed and considered for further action.

Boat Education Bag is now available

The 'boat bag' is now available for guest sails. It is located in the storage locker adjacent to the stairs. It contains a notebook including historical/current photos of Denning's Point, the Beacon-Newburgh Ferry, Long Dock Beacon, Riverfront Park, as well as basic information about the Sloop Club, the Woody, Hudson River wildlife, and some other basic nautical "know how." Other items include various "hand's on" materials, such as knot tying resources, a brick from Denning Point, etc.

Walkkill River Water in Ulster County

The Walkkill River runs from southern Orange County north into Ulster and joins with the Roundout River near Kingston, before flowing into the Hudson River.

In the last two years leaking containers of chemicals were left on the river bank. Last fall it was highly infectious medical waste.

The Walkkill River in Ulster County needs many people watching; many different skills are needed, publicity, canoeing, photography, etc. If you are near the Walkkill in Orange County consider becoming a liaison person between Orange & Ulster counties. Alert children and teens can function as lookouts to spot possible trouble that older eyes might miss.

Upcoming training in September will involve accompanying the River Watch in Orange County, to learn how to document pollution sites, count fish, measure erosion, and much more. Join us help to monitor and protect the Walkkill River in Ulster county
