Beacon Sloop Club General Meeting

Minutes, March 4, 2016

'The Farewell Shanty' was sung acapella by Susan Boszo, Karen Hinderstein, Ken Miller, James Malchow, Ben Mazur and Hope Altkin in memory of Saul Rozinsky, who passed away this past Sunday. He had been sick for a while. The tentative date for his memorial is March 19 at the Unitarian Church in Rock Tavern. Watch for details.

New and returning people were welcomed to the meeting. One person returned from 25 years ago.

Treasury –The Opening balance was \$212,897. The closing balance was \$220,900.

Woody –Jim Birmingham reported that we brought the boat to the Hudson River Maritime Museum in August. The shipwright worked on it to late October. Since then when the shipwrights moved to work on the Clearwater, regular volunteers have been cranking through the work (with inspections by the shipwrights). They have been working on frames, which is above & beyond what we thought we'd do as volunteers. So far, we have paid out \$59,000 with another bill of \$44,000 to this point. There is a work party this Sunday. Skilled and unskilled workers are invited.

Sail Classes – Classes start April 13 on Wednesdays through the 1st week of June. The instructors are the Captains. The cost is \$50, which includes a book.

Upcoming Events – April 2 – the 10th annual Woody Dinner will be held at Chateau Beacon with dinner, music (Judith Tullock Band), dancing, raffles, door prizes. \$60/person.

April 10 – the Women's Work Concert at the Howland Cultural Center. Songs and performance by women. 3 PM, \$15.

May 7 – the second annual Pete Seeger Birthday Open House here at the Clubhouse from 12 -6. This year we would like to have a show of Pete Seeger pictures. See Ken Miller.

May 14 – A Day at Sloop Brewing, Elizaville, NY, on an original patentee farm. It is a whole day event that includes beer, a glass, music, games, brewery tours, karaoke, pig roast and other food (including vegetarian chili) and a bon fire. \$60/person. Tickets are available on Brown Paper Bag Tickets or direct from the committee members. This event was objected to by some vegan members of the club who felt that an environmental club should not have a pig roast. And that perhaps we are losing integrity by trying to raise money. On the other hand, as it was pointed out, we have meat at festivals, we are not all vegans and we can choose to not eat meat and still support this event.

June will have the 40th annual Strawberry Festival. The first planning meeting will be later this month. See Rosemary Thomas. Needed are an oven czar and people (including apprentices) to run the sound systems.

Lecture Series – The next lecture is March 31 (the date has changed). Sarah Womer of 'Zero to Go' will be speaking. The theme is Think Global, Act Local but also ties in with last month's issue have developing local sustainable businesses. There will also be a video on people who have taken initiative at the grass roots level.

April's speaker will be Stephen Petrus, of the Folk City Exhibit at the Museum of the City of NY, and in conjunction with the American Folk Music Museum Center.

Announcements –

Tom LaBarr said the Town of Fishkill Environmental Board is looking for members. The board reviews building plans of all proposed construction. See Tom.

Diane Hird is running against Sean Patrick Mahoney in the Democratic primary. She says she is concerned about many environmental issues as well as income inequality in the City of Newburgh.

Eugene Hammond spoke about the Pilgrim Pipeline and the proposed areas that it will travel through. Tremendous opposition has stopped the Thruway from being the lead agent. He urged us to call Cuomo.

Nora spoke of the situation in Honduras.

Rick O. shared the news that the Passaic River is going to be dredged and cleaned. It will take decades and be financed by polluters. The EPA is moving ahead on declaring the Hackensack River as a Superfund site.

David Eberle announced Friday, March 25 – Movies that Matter at the 1st Presbyterian Church – "The Newburgh Sting"

Alan Zolner said the 12th annual 'Swim Across the Hudson' will take place August 6. Start training now.

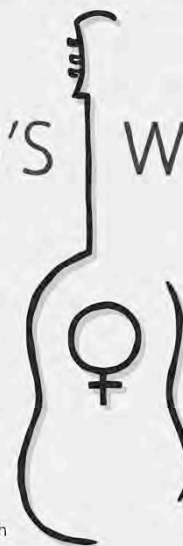
March 12 there will be an evening of poetry and song remembering the Irish Rebellion at the Tomkins Corner Cultural Center.

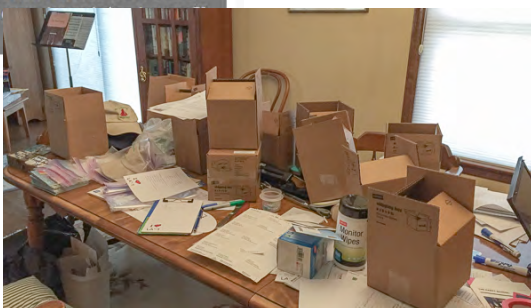

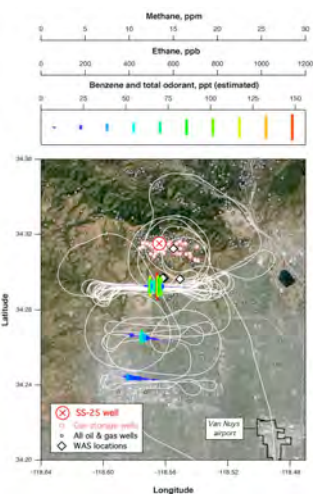

NOAA Releases Study of Natural Gas Leak in Aliso Canyon



The study was refined and finalized after the leak was permanently sealed. According to the study, co-lead by NOAA's Tom Ryerson and Scientific Aviation and University of California-Davis' Stephen Conley, the leak doubled the amount of methane emissions for the entire Los Angeles Basin. More than 5,000 households were

evacuated. Traces of other substances, namely benzene, were also found in the atmosphere. Benzene is a known carcinogen and was a point of particular concern and attention, according to the study.

The leak began in late October 2015 and was sealed on Feb. 11. One of the 115 wells of the natural gas storage facility at Aliso Canyon began leaking natural gas that amounted to over 100,000 tons of methane by February.

**Toward a New Human Ecology

We were honored to have Hudson River Maritime Museum executive director Russ Lange as our guest speaker for the February lecture.

He documented how the valley and its riverfront communities evolved from vital nodes on water based transportation system, to industrial sites, to targets of urban renewal. He argued that the exponential drop in shipping costs was a major driver of these transitions. We are now in an era where it costs \$0.23 to ship a laptop from China.

Mr. Lange argued that it's time for local non-profits to engage the same sort of grassroots actions that led to the cleanup of the Hudson to revitalize her riverfront cities and towns.

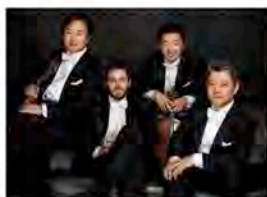
