Beacon Sloop Club General Meeting

Minutes, June 4, 2021, recorded by Tom Elliott

Ben Mazer and Lydia Adams Davis led a group singing, "Rainbow Race," and **Susan Berliner** welcomed us, calling the meeting to order at 7:36 p.m.

Treasurer's Report: Aaron shared the Profit and Loss Report for April 2021, which is in the newsletter, below. With no questions, Susan thanked Aaron for his report.

Woody and Harbor Report: Captain Tom LaBarr reported that training sails are commencing with the Woody fully rigged and sailing nicely and the electric motor in good working order. There has been a problem with silt in the harbor at low tide, possibly caused by the Newburgh-Beacon Ferry's hiatus. If you are Interested in sailing and want to join a weekday crew, come any weekday at 6 p.m. and apply to any captain. No experience is needed, as we will train you. New crew is needed now, and those who aspire to become captains are especially appreciated as we have need of one now and two or three more in the near future, due to anticipated retirements. If you are a Woody sailor, but have not been receiving emails, contact James Malchow at jpmalchow@gmail.com to get on the list.

Strawberry Celebration: Rosemary urged members to participate and volunteer in the June 13 members Strawberry Celebration that will be held on the grounds of the club house. Rosemary said we have been working to secure local berries delivered, but if we can't, we may pick some ourselves at Grieg Farm, or buy good quality ones from California from local markets. Two members said they could pick berries and we have the whipped cream donated by members already. We will need volunteers at 9:00 a.m. to start setting up tents, tables, and chairs, and we especially need volunteers to bake biscuits the day before, since we won't have the oven to bake them on site. Hulling and chopping berries will begin at 10 a.m., and we will begin serving strawberry shortcake at noon. We won't have any smoothies this year. As this is a member's celebration rather than a public festival, there will be no food vendors present, so bring a dish if you can. There will be a Circle of Song during the event.

Woody Guthrie Birthday Party: Our party event for members is scheduled to be held at the Red Barn on Saturday, July 10. We are waiting hear from Scenic Hudson if the venue will be ready and available to us on that date. This is just a party for us, and not a fund raiser. We may have lawn games as well as food and refreshment.

Clearwater Update: Rosemary told us that The Great Hudson River Revival will be a 12-hour virtual event this year, and a major fundraiser for the Clearwater, the original boat that started the clean-up of the Hudson and a strong advocate for its protection ever since. The pandemic has been very difficult for Clearwater, and economic recovery is still returning slowly, given the reliance on revenue earned from educational programs and school visits. Educational and recreational sailing has resumed on Clearwater this season, but donations are still needed. Please make this the "one time dig deep" for Clearwater to not only keep the boat sailing, but to help finish its last renovation cycle scheduled for this fall.

Environmental Report:

Tom LaBarr told us that one of the best things any of us can do to help the environment is to grow food for ourselves and others. Not much land is needed, as deck and patio pots can produce quite a few vegetables, and even lofty apartment dwellers can grow herbs in window pots. Also, community garden space is available at Stony Kill Farm just over the Wappingers county line from Beacon, so you can have your own organic plot there. Back in the old days of the mid-twentieth century, kitchen gardens were prominent in many houses, and not just in rural areas. Many of these gardens could make a family almost self-sufficient, with canned and pickled items lasting well into the winter. "Eat Local!" Tom said, signing off.

Membership: Alan said a lot of memberships had not been processed during lockdown but are now caught up. He encouraged any who still need to update their memberships to see him or use the online link on the membership page of the website to be current again.

Announcements:

Lydia Adams Davis announced that she and four other musicians have teamed up for a performance of original songs and standards. The concert is July 24, 8 p.m.

at the Howland Cultural Center. Tickets for both live and online attendees are available. Hear Lydia with Patrick Stanfield Jones, Marji Zintz, Judy Kass, and a new singer to our area, Joe Boggess.

Lydia also told us that she has volunteered to check in kayakers for this year's (July 24) River Swim to benefit River Pool at Beacon. She encouraged others to join her in helping out with this worthwhile and fun event.

Adjournment: With no more announcements, Susan adjourned the meeting and the Circle of Song began.

Opposing the Danskammer Expansion, Advocating for a Sustainable Future

Efforts continue at the grassroots level and through local governments to stop the expansion of the facility into a full-time-gas-fired plant.

25 municipalities have passed resolutions in opposition and 150 elected officials have signed a letter to Governor Cuomo. You can help by staying in touch and following up with your representatives.
