### **Beacon Sloop Club General Meeting**

Ken, Lydia, and Ben gave us *Rainbow Race*, and Rob brought the meeting to order at 7:28pm, welcoming all. He reminded us that we are a carry in/carry out facility. He also asked if there were any first-time visitors, and the club welcomed Marcedo and Akito of Beacon and Victoria and Richard from New York City. Rob thanked Mary Arnold for cleaning the Multrum this month. Next came reports.

**Treasurer's Report:** Aaron gave the Treasurer's report for May, which is in the newsletter, below.

**Memorial Trees:** Joyce spoke to us about the four trees that have been planted near the clubhouse going up the hill. They need our help in watering them to grow into healthy trees, and then the Club has the City's permission to add plaques at their base to honor members of the Sloop Club who have passed away. Joyce asked for volunteers to help in the watering and took phone numbers of those who could.

**Strawberry Festival Report:** Rosemary said the Festival was wonderful and thanked David and Margaret especially for hosting the pre-Festival preparation party, and Joyce for getting the T-shirts made and delivered, Susan for organizing all of the musicians who played for free, Tom for his sledge hammer work, and the captains who provided the free sails to visitors. She thanked us all for our help and said if we didn't have a chance to volunteer this year, come next year!

**Woody Guthrie Birthday Party:** Susan told us that the annual thank you party for volunteers will by Saturday, July 16<sup>th</sup> from 4 - 9 pm this year at the Sloop Club on Red Flynn Drive. A main course will be provided along with soft drinks, but asked attendees to please bring sides and deserts and additional drinks if you like but come to the party either way. There may or may not be sails depending on captains and crew being available and weather permitting.

**Great Hudson River Swim:** Rob reminded us that the swim takes placed this month on July 30<sup>th</sup>.

**Corn Festival:** Rosemary told us the Corn Festival will be held on August 14<sup>th</sup> at Pete and Toshi Riverfront Park again this year. We will be serving freshly husked and boiled local sweet corn. Volunteers will be needed again, so mark your calendars. Next month we will do volunteer sign up.

Woody Report: Assistant Maintenance Coordinator Max welcomed us to July and said the Woody is now sailing Mondays, Thursdays and Friday nights. People wishing to go for a sail should call Susan Berliner at (845) 527-8671 to schedule a sail for groups of up to ten people. Max told us that one big item of maintenance that still needs doing is hauling the boat out at White's Marina to inspect, scrape and repaint the bottom. Volunteers will be greatly needed for this task, which is planned for the last week of July, or perhaps the first week of August, depending on White's schedule and the weather. Work will be supervised by maintenance crew members and occur between 10am to 5pm during the work period. Please contact Max if you can help.

Clearwater Update: Rosemary said Clearwater has been sailing since mid-June, hosting educational sails, public sails, and chartered outings. It's great to be back on the river! Also, there is a fall fundraiser coming up. Stay tuned for details.

**Environmental Report:** Captain Tom asked us all to vote for candidates who are dedicated to environmental action. The Supreme Court has weakened our cause across the country, and around the globe. Speaking out and voting is now more important than ever.

Announcements: John McLaughlin told us of a new "Silver" mapping tool that identifies sites suitable for solar power installations which is very effective. It is helping area counties find locations that don't take away farmlands or other valuable land useage as we expand our green power capacity. Contact John for free training that is available. Victoria MacKenzie-Childs told us of her Ferry, "Yankee" that was in the Ellis Island Ferry Service and is now 116 years old. She and her husband own it and are looking to find a permanent or perhaps series of berths for it to be purposed as an educational and program oriented floating museum. Contact her at victoria@yankeeferry.nyc. Jamie told us the Coast Guard Auxiliary Flotilla that covers our area is looking for new volunteers. It is a wonderful opportunity to learn about watercraft and help our area boating community. And, no, you don't have to join the Navy to be a member. Jamie took names and contact info of interested persons. Alan reminded us that today is a special day for Sloop Club members near and far, as it is Toshi Seeger's 100th birthday. Eugene told us that Clearwater will have a table at the Ulster County Fair coming up and need volunteers. Call Manna Jo or John M. to arrange. Court decision to curtail the
Environmental Protection

Last week's 6:3 decision blocks the EPA's ability to impose broad rules that would compel utilities to close fossilfuel plants and switch to

renewable energy sources. The court's narrow reading of the Clean Air Act led to its ruling that Congress must legislate such sweeping mandates.

This presents a huge setback to efforts to combat climate change and to transition to a green economy. Even though the impacts of climate change are becoming more evident every day, it is unlikely that Congress will act on their own. Given the current situation in Washington, we must redouble our efforts to advocate for sustainable and equitable solutions.

For the sake of our children and grandchildren we must continue to advocate, educate, motivate and vote.


