Beacon Sloop Club General Meeting

Minutes, November 4, recorded by Vicki Fox

Lydia Adams Davis, Ken Miller and Rob May opened us with Lorre Wyatt and Pete's number, *God's Counting on Me, God's Counting on You*, quite timely before the election. We had a moment of silence for the passing of Colin King, one of our earliest captains. Tom Elliott volunteered to take the recycling, Ken Miller the garbage. Rob thanked Gail Moran for being October's Multrum Hero.

Aaron Verdile delivered the **Treasury Report**. Revenue exceeded expenses in September.

Rosemary Thomas gave the **Pumpkin Festival "post-mortem"**: "It was fabulous!" She thanked everybody. We learned that food tickets worked great, but also that our onsite food-prep uses a lot of electricity and we need more power strips and lines for next year.

Susan Berliner announced the **Holiday Sing** December 10 will begin at 5 or 6. We bring drinks and finger foods, not just dessert, and all our favorite musicians come and play. Again, this year, we will collect donations for Common Ground Farm, which contributes thousands of pounds of organic produce to food pantries in Wappingers, Fishkill, Beacon and Newburgh. Common Ground distributed over 14,000 pounds of organic produce to people in need this year. Checks to the Beacon Sloop Club should be earmarked at the bottom "CG-food donation".

Rob announced a Club clean-up November 20 around noon. He told us Antony Tseng has volunteered to train people in conjunction with our getting an **AED** for the clubhouse. A sign-up sheet was passed for those interested.

Steve Schwartz delivered the Woody Report. The Woody is now in Haverstraw. The mast was pulled out so we could make a five-year inspection. It looks great. We sailed down on Wednesday in perfect conditions, taking just 3 hours, 15 minutes. Saturday at eight we'll be loading up the frame at the Settlement Camp and bringing it to Haverstraw. Having Max Smith on maintenance crew has brought amazing efficiency. We'll probably have a Zoom meeting next week about winter maintenance and we'll also have a block party. The sailing handling lines are ratty; the time is now to upgrade to new lines over the winter. Rob thanked Captain Steve and crew for completely cleaning out the workspace in the Clubhouse. That reminded Steve to remind Rosemary that she should also be thanking the Woody crew for their work during Pumpkin Fest. "And they would like to get forks along with their pie!"

Steve proclaimed, "On behalf of the Club, I would like to thank the captain and crew of the Woody Guthrie, who almost never get thanked!"

Nominations for 2023 officers are:

President: Rob May, Patricia Finnerty; Vice President: Vince Farina; Treasurer: Aaron Verdile; Secretary: Mary Arnold.

Additional people can be nominated at the December meeting. People need to be a paid-up member to nominate, vote or run for office.

Joyce Hanson thanked Vicki Fox for jumping in as secretary this year.

Steve announced that we have decided to get rid of the **Ed Teach** boat. "Antony has gone through great effort to show it to buyers. Right now, we have 1 fish on the line, 1 person I need to get back to, and 1 person who wants it but can't pay money for it." So it looks like we will finally relieve ourselves of this boat we have been paying insurance on but not using.

Rosemary delivered the good news that **Clearwater**'s finances have improved. They have an updated financial report available, and they are within their budget. But they have little cash reserves. "Now would be a great time to contribute, early for the Fall Appeal." Clearwater's budget problems had prevented them from getting grants. And not sailing last year hurt their revenue.

There will be a concert for Clearwater in Rosendale on November 6.

Clearwater's mast has been pulled and inspected. It will be 10 years before they have to pull the mast again.

During the **Environmental Report**, Tom LaBarr thanked the volunteers at the E-tent. We had one blue claw crab and two eels thanks to Jeanie Fitzgerald loaning us her traps. Tom told us he had the Sloop Club's enormous fish trap if the E-tent folks ever wish to use it. Jade Batycki volunteered to make sure the fish trap works. John McLaughlin volunteered to check with the DEC about our license.

But the most important thing anyone can do for the environment right now is VOTE! Turn over the ballot and vote for the NYS proposition. Tom also reminded us that having proper house insulation (with cracks under doors to prevent carbon monoxide build-up) is key. "I did my house one wall at a time. You will recoup your insulation costs very rapidly!" There was also a discussion about how Orange County recycles almost everything delivered to their transfer station on Route 17K, unlike Royal Carting.

General announcements included a call for volunteers to work with the Coast Guard Auxiliary. Joyce Hanson auctioned off a bottle of gin and a framed poster for Common Ground's work with food pantries. Mary Poppiins announced coverage of the Pumpkin Fest in the Current, Beacon Free Press and Hudson Valley Press. She distributed copies of the Free Press. Fighting the good fight against plastic. Wayne Kocher sold seven stainless steel "tiffins" (reusable containers for restaurant leftovers) and donated all proceeds to the Club. Veekas Ashoka of the recently created group Beacon Climate Action Now told us they were trying to pass a bill in Beacon that all new buildings use geothermal and induction stoves instead of oil and gas. He asked us to sign our names if we supported it. John McLaughlin announced the statewide All Electric Building Bill, which would lead to lower emissions, and said we may be able to pass it on a state level. Joyce pointed out that new buildings in New Paltz are all solar. Jade asked for advice on where to dock her houseboat for the winter and Purim suggested King's Marina in Montrose, which has a covered docking area. ADJOURN.
