Towards this end, the Beacon Sloop Club is offering transportation and full scholarships to our sailing classes, to five deserving local candidates. Vanessa is also coordinating with Alan and Rachel Zollner to provide water familiarity and basic swimming instruction in the River Pool. We acknowledge the efforts of Tom Elliott and Steve Schwartz in working with Vanessa to augment this Community Sailing Program.

Meanwhile, the Harbor Committee led by Ben Fiege is hard at work repairing our docks in anticipation of a busy sailing season. Towards the end of the month Ben will arrange to have floating docks returned and installed for the season. While all this is going on, Club members and their guests have been privileged to enjoy the work of two extremely talented and thoroughly entertaining artists in the Winter Artist and Lecture Series, organized by Alan Thomas and Steve van der Merwe. In January, gifted young singer-songwriter Owen Walsh enthralled a spellbound audience with his beautiful songs, providing a rich sampling of the next generation of folk singers. Last month, widely acclaimed professional photographer Stephen Mallon presented his distinctive and arresting images of industrial sites that find beauty and power in unexpected places. Make plans to attend the next lecture which will be a celebration of the 50th Anniversary of the Clean Water Act.

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Beacon Sloop Club General Meeting

Minutes, March 3, recorded by Mary Arnold

Call to Order 7:30 PM. Music by Max Smith, Rob May, Ben Mazer with "Do Re Me" and "Deep Blue Sea." Rob May announced this is a Take-in/Take-out facility and asked for volunteers to take home the recyclables (Tom Elliott) and trash (Rob). Thanks to Multrum Heroes Vanessa Nisperos (February), and <u>Marcell Song?</u> (March).

Treasurer Aaron Verdile reported income and expenses for January, including \$800 income for the sale of the strawberry trailer. Investments are in socially responsible funds, 60 % in equities, 40 % in bonds. There is a \$15,000 variable rate CD—funds set aside for major expenses and Woody maintenance.

Community Sailing Program: Jamie Cupolo reported Newburgh/Beacon Coast Guard Flotilla has been established. **Vanessa Nisperos** thanked club members for input and collaboration to developing a Community Sailing Program that was approved by the Executive Board for youth and underserved communities The program includes community partners, water safety and sailing education. Harbor boat owners will participate with coast guard approved and insured boats. Families will become BSC members.

Woody Report: Max Smith is testing new information and sign-up sheets on SignUpGenius, Facebook, and WhatsApp. "I am trying to reach the broader sloop club community and get more interest with people helping out to maintain the boat." Max is using a WhatsApp group to communicate activities, in addition to emails and the Beacon Sloop club Facebook page. The Woody "Block Party" is Saturday March 4. It will be a potluck and there will be beverages. The Woody will be back to Beacon from Haverstraw will April 4, 5 or 6, depending on weather. A grant application to pay for a new charging cable was not successful this grant cycle, but we will apply again. **Alan Thomas** said the same package can be used for other foundations.

Harbor: Mary Arnold reported Winter harbor projects include repairing the aluminum Long Dock ramp which requires a TIG Welder. Docks are anticipated to come back from White's Marina at the end of March, weather permitting. There was discussion of shared info between the Woody and the Harbor email lists. To get onto the Harbor mailing list, contact **Ben Fiege**.

Sailing classes: Mary Arnold reported the Sailing Class will run from April 12 to May 31, 7-9 p.m. Alan Thomas has created an online registration site, and the event has been posted on Facebook. Class info will be shared with the Harbor and Woody email lists. Instructors include Woody Captains James Malchow, Steve Schwartz, Tom LaBarr, Ben Mazer, and former Clearwater Captain Betsy Garthwaite. Ben Fiege and Vanessa Nisperos will provide info on the Harbor and Community Sailing Program.

Clearwater Report: Rosemary Thomas reported the boat is finishing up winter maintenance. The first sail will be April 16. Many former crew members attended an open boat last weekend.

March 19 is the 8th Clearwater Gala. Honorees include Ronald Zorrilla (Spirit of the Hudson Award), and Betsy Garthwaite (Lifetime Contribution). BSC took out a full-page ad and is offering a sail on the Woody for the auction. Riverpool is a sponsor. There will be both silent online auction (open now) live auction. Clearwater has large budget gap they are trying to close this year.

Environmental Report: John McLaughlin reported

Clearwater's monthly environmental action report. will focus on the Round Goby, an invasive bottom feeding fish that has invaded the Great Lakes and is now in the Hudson through the Erie Canal. Managing the problem is complicated by the agencies that have ownership and authority over the canal. He recommended putting pressure on Governor Hochul, to mitigate the entry of invasive species. John also reported that the River Pool is expected to go in the water as early as May and the River Swim is on August 5.

General Announcements

Joyce Hanson: Thanked everyone who came out in December to Newburgh Brewing Company. BSC made 10 percent. Next chance: Friday, March 24, Newburgh Brewery, 4-10 p.m. with 4-6 happy hour.

Vickie Fox: Raised attention to the human rights crisis at the Southern border. Trump's immigration restrictions are due to expire, but President Biden has proposed new rules that deny asylum from anyone except people from Cuba, Haiti, Nicaragua and Venezuela, and will crack down on those who fail to use the plan's legal pathways. The last day to comment is March 27. She urged people comment and contact representatives. Vickie also remembered <u>Bill</u> <u>Haigney</u> who died unexpected this past year. Joyce Hanson stated, "He was a wonderful volunteer."

Judy Allen, representing Indian Point Safe Energy Coalition, reported the Holtec International is planning to dump 1 million gallons of radioactive water in the Hudson. She urged members to contact Governor Hochul, House representatives, and senators Schumer and Gillibrand. Judy advocated leaving the water in storage tanks for the radiation to dissipate through half-life. John McLaughlin noted that water releases for years on a small scale, but this is a major single release. Rosemary Thomas noted that the town wants to redevelop the property. Wayne Kocher discussed the environmental impact of the Ohio Train derailment, and concerns about chemicals being transported by rail in the Hudson Valley. He also discussed issues related to fracking.

Vanessa Nisperos asked City of Newburgh residents to support young people in Newburgh who are trying to get on the city council ballot.

Rob May auctioned a Pete Seeger T-Shirt. "Sold to **Joyce Hanson** for \$20!"

Vince Farina made motion to adjourn, second by Wayne Kocher. Meeting adjourned at 8:28 p.m.

Hudson Valley Environmental News

From Clearwater's March EA update:

Indian Point: Holtec proposes release of contaminated water into the Hudson River.

At a February 2 meeting of the NYS Decommissioning Oversight Board, Holtec International announced its plans to release treated – but still radioactive – water into the Hudson River beginning as early as August 2023. Clearwater supports the community's call to store the fuel pool water on site. In response to Hotec's announcement and the Covergece organizing efforts, NYS Senator Peter Harckham and Assemblywoman Dana Levenberg have introduced legislation (S5181) to prohibit the discharge of radiological agents into waters of New York State. <u>Read the bill here.</u>

On March 6, the Westchester County Legislature passed a Memorializing Resolution opposing Holtec's proposed releases of radioactive water into the Hudson. And on March 8 in a 16-0 vote, the Rockland County Legislature unanimously approved a resolution calling on Governor Hochul and relevant agencies to prevent Holtec International from discharging radioactive water into the Hudson River. Many other municipalities are considering taking the same action.

What is Tritium?(source EPA, NRC)

Tritium (abbreviated as ³H) is a hydrogen atom that has two neutrons in the nucleus and one proton. Tritium is produced naturally in the upper atmosphere when cosmic rays strike nitrogen molecules in the air. Tritium is also produced during nuclear weapons explosions, and as a byproduct in nuclear reactors. Although tritium can be a gas, its most common form is in water because radioactive tritium reacts with oxygen to form water.

Tritium emits a very weak beta particle. People are exposed to small amounts of tritium every day, since it is widely dispersed in the environment and in the food chain. Tritium primarily enters the body when people swallow tritiated water, inhale tritium as a gas in the air, or absorb it through their skin. Once tritium enters the body, it disperses quickly and is uniformly distributed throughout the body. Since tritium is almost always found as water, it goes directly into soft tissues and organs. Tritium is excreted through the urine within a month or so after ingestion. Organically bound tritium (tritium that is incorporated in organic compounds) can remain in the body for a longer period.

The current EPA standard for drinking water is 0.02 microcuries of tritium per liter.

The NRC requires that nuclear plant operators must keep offsite radiation doses from gas and liquid releases as low as reasonably achievable. For liquid releases, such as diluted tritium, the ALARA annual offsite dose objective is 3 mrem to the whole body and 10 mrem to any organ of someone living close to the plant boundary. This ALARA objective is 3 percent of the annual public radiation dose limit of 100 mrem and a small fraction of the natural background radiation dose.


An Act to amend the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, known as the Clean Water Act, was a landmark piece of environmental legislation, which went into effect Oct. 18, 1972, when the house overrode Richard Nixon's veto.

The act established interim goals of achieving "fishable and swimmable" waters by 1983, and eliminating all discharges of pollutants into navigable waters by 1985

As we celebrate the 50th anniversary of the establishment of a framework for protecting the nations waterways, it's clear that there is still much work to be done.



Bill Haigney: A Generous Spirit



Our dear friend Bill Haigney suddenly died after a short illness February 7, 2023. He was only 66.

Bill moved here to the mid-Hudson only recently, but he made his presence known at the Club pretty quickly. Some may remember Bill's indefatigable volunteering at the Corn Fest this summer,

his cheerful banter, or his clear tenor singing voice that made Lydia say, "You've got to come sing with me, sometime!"

Less known to BSC members who only knew him for a few months was Bill's many years saving hundreds -perhaps thousands -- of lives. He was an emergency medical technician with FDNY in the Bronx for 31 years. But for 35 years, he volunteered with the South Orangetown Ambulance Corps in Rockland County, and during that time, was also a volunteer firefighter. Not surprisingly, Bill opted to be an organ donor, so even his death could save lives.

Nothing made Bill happier than giving presents and helping others. When he moved to Highland Falls, he devoted much time to helping a solitary elderly woman undo a scam-artist, clean out her house, sell it, and move into an apartment. A smile or a chuckle was Bill's favorite reward.
